#### The Pen Pal Project - from Norway to Uganda - by The British International School (BISS)

In 2015, The British International School of Stavanger set up a link with a local Junior School in rural Uganda. The link was established for the students to exchange letters and photographs about their lives and schools. This pen pal project was a great opportunity for the students at BISS to realise how important penmanship is, even in our modern day and age, and how exciting it can be to receive letters, especially when they have travelled a long way!

At the beginning of 2017, Litmus Light Junior School in Matete, Uganda, sent an invitation to the British School of Stavanger to visit their school in Uganda to exchange teaching and learning practices. Soon after, planning began and three teachers travelled to Uganda in October 2017.

The teachers had the opportunity to visit schools in the capital city and spent four days teaching at Litmus Light Junior School. The visit revealed a lot of challenges which students and teachers face on a daily basis. However, the bond between the two schools was ever present and the teachers were made very welcome by the school and the whole community throughout their stay.

The visit sparked a lot of thought and conversation amongst the teachers at the British International School of Stavanger and ideas to establish small projects are being discussed for the future.


